The Graduate School of Creative Arts Therapies just held a conference that was the first of its kind as it dealt with Arab and Palestinian art with a focus on music, theater and the plastic arts. The conference included discussion groups, lectures, concerts and plays. Throughout the conference, the meaning behind works of Arab-Palestinian art in consideration of its marginal place in the landscape of cultural creativity in Israel was examined, and a discussion evolved regarding issues tied to the craft of creation, its uniqueness, means of exposure, and the link between the audience, the creators and the establishment. Prof. Sharon Poliakine, Head of the Fine Arts Department, and Dr. Dorit Yerushalmy of the Theater Department, were interviewed about the conference on radio's Reshet Bet.



A new study by Prof. (Emeritus) Eviatar Nevo and Dr. Tamar Kis-Papo of the Institute of Evolution is attempting to ascertain the characteristics that allow a certain type of fungus to grow in the Dead Sea. The researchers, whose study is gaining interest around the world, believe that the moment they find the cause of the thriving fungus in such salty water, it would be possible to start developing agriculture based on water that is not sweet. The research findings were published, among others, in The Times of Israel, Science Daily and Space Daily.





Pouring salt on the wound of depression. 

"When the former Head of Israeli Intelligence, Amos Yadlin, determines unequivocally that bombing the reactor in Iraq was strategically justified, in contrast to the opinion of most of the world's experts, he is misleading. Whoever believes this might just consider a similar move against Iran," says Prof. Uri Bar Joseph of the School of Political Sciences in an op-ed piece he wrote for Ynet in response to Yadlin's interview in Yediot Aharonot.

"The scarcity of water, global warming and the rise of sea levels, even if these were to take place on a different timetable than expected, will bring about migrations from all the areas hit with these problems to any place that it is possible to escape to, including immigrants from Africa to Israel," said Prof. Arnon Soffer, Head of the Chaikin Chair in Geostrategy, for an article in the Masa Aher journal on the ramifications of climatic changes on migration patterns.



A good person to meet is Prof. Niva Elkin-Koren of the Faculty of Law, according to the <u>Haaretz</u> paper's Independence Day issue. Dr. Soli Shahvar, Director of the Ezri Center for Iran and Gulf Studies, gave an interview in Persian for the "Voice of America" regarding the visit of the United States National Security Advisor, Ms. Susan Rice, in Israel. Dr. Shahvar claims that if it turns out that the Iranians are fulfilling the demands of the nuclear program, then theoretically speaking, the position of Prime Minister Netanyahu against Iran will be weakened. Conversely, the bitter rivalry of factions within Iran will cause the conservative factions to release anti-Israeli statements that will actually help Netanyahu in strengthening his claims.
