



The Student Union, in cooperation with the "Arvut" organization, hosted a round table symposium on the topic "The Student as a Leader of Social Change" attended by hundreds of students and academic faculty members. "The people have the power to create change. This change must be led by education and explanation, not just by youth and the younger generation, but rather by a process of education for new values that we must all undergo," said the Dean of the Faculty of Education, Prof. Ofra Mayseless, at one of the round table discussions. 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35 years of excellence: The Ofakim program, a University program for excellent students, marked 35 years to its establishment last week in a festive alumni conference that took place at the "Meirav" Center of the Hof HaCarmel Regional Council. The conference, that attracted about 150 alumni from all the years of the program, included lectures and round table discussions along with a social gathering, wine and live music that lasted throughout the night.





The Faculty of the Humanities' Department of Archaeology and the Zinman Institute of Archaeology hosted the annual conference of the Israel Prehistoric Society, organized by Dr. Daniel Rosenberg and adjunct researcher Reuven Yeshuron from the Department of Archaeology. The hundreds of researchers and archaeology enthusiasts who took part in the event heard lectures about the research of ancient hunting tools; the ecology of the Neanderthals in Israel; the structure of the residential site among the first permanent settlements in our area; the domestication of wildlife and additional revolutions that characterized the transition to life in agricultural villages, etc.



Hundreds of researchers and professionals participated in the Department of Occupational Therapy's seminar on: "DCD – a motor impediment in children and adults: the neurophysiology and daily functions – what's new, what's the connection?" According to the conference organizer, Prof. Sara Rosenblum, about 10% of the public is dealing with DCD on a daily basis, and most are not even aware that there is a medical diagnosis - Developmental Coordination Disorder.




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The University's Department of Computer Science held its annual scholarships awards ceremony in honor of Captain Uri Michael Akavia who was killed in the Yom Kippur War during the battle over the HaGolan Heights. 20 scholarships were awarded at the ceremony to excelling students; 10 of these were to high-school students from the unique "Etgar" program that enables excellent high-school students to start a Bachelor's degree in computer science.



There is a new project underway at the Dean of Students for book lovers from the Ron Adler Memorial Fund: "Book Lovers Project." In this project, all the book lovers are invited to the third floor of the Hatter Student Building where there is a table with books of various languages – new and used – for each person to choose. All the books have been donated to the project, including by the University Press that donated dozens of new books to the project.

"Today, about 90% of organized terrorism on the Internet is being carried out through the social media.
