Dozens of researchers participated in the "Laughter and Communication" conference at the beginning of the week, which was organized by the Department of Communication in cooperation with the Haifa Wizo Academic Center. The conference dealt with the different ways in which humor has been utilized in the media over the last few centuries and up to the present in different areas related to history and culture.



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The study of Prof. Yariv Tsfati of the Department of Communication and Dr. Israel Waismel-Manor of the School of Political Sciences, which found that more attractive politicians receive more "face time" on screen, has received much US coverage, including the prestigious NEW YORK TIMES.



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The Ministry of Environmental Protection established the Israel Climate Change Knowledge Center, where the University of Haifa is leading the research activity. Prof. Ofira Ayalon from the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Management warns in a recent article to NRG that despite the importance of the subject, the Center's future is not yet clear: "As of today, the Center's future is not clear. Currently, all of the activity is being led by the Ministry of Environmental Protection, at a time when other government offices should understand that the environmental issues that are being discussed at the Center are relevant to them as well."



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Last week, the Israeli media gave a lot of coverage to a study by Prof. Gabriel Weimann of the Department of Communication, which surveyed the activities of terror organizations in social networks. This week, it was the turn of foreign media, including the central news agency UPI, YAHOO, NEWSWISE, etc.




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In light of the great coverage of the study, Prof. Weimann also interviewed for *The Marker* on the future directions of online terror warfare. He said, "The problem is that the Saudi hackers could be more than hackers with simple abilities, but rather hackers that will be enlisted by terror organizations whose goals will not be credit cards, but rather, for example, the Israel electrical system that is entirely supervised by computers. This is a frightening and dangerous terrorist threat."



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Prof. Eliezer Somer, clinical psychologist at the School of Social Work, appeared as an expert on Amnon Levi's program on *Channel 10* which documented a woman suffering from dissociative identity disorder. He then later interviewed on the subject on the *Channel 10* show *London and Kirschenbaum*.



The Marker featured an article about the ban in Israel of selling incandescent ("yellow") light bulbs. The article cited the studies of Prof. Abraham Haim, Head of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Management, who found in multiple studies a connection between exposure to "white" light and cancer. The article was also featured on the Walla website.



Dr. Doron Navot of the School of Political Sciences wrote an opinion piece for *Channel 2 News* in which he discussed the decision to indict former Prime Minister Ehud Olmert and the possible ramifications of such a decision on the struggle against government corruption. "Nothing is pleasing regarding the bleak picture of the indictment – the fact that the prosecution passed the Buzaglo [Joe Schmo] Test is the bare minimum that is required in the country, and not some badge of excellence," he said.



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Dr. Uri Shanas of the Department of Evolutionary and Environmental Biology continues to lead the struggle against the mining in the Samra dunes. In an article to the *Haaretz* newspaper he said, "We will continue to come here even if it lasts for several straight weeks."



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The biggest information leakers are the consumers themselves, warns Dean of the Faculty of Law, Prof. Niva Elkin-Koren in a *Globes* article. "People have become transparent, and the information is not erasable. We find it difficult to assess the future damage to us," she said.



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Prof. Avraham Ben-Zvi of the School of Political Sciences interviewed for the Galey Tzahal show Osim Tzohoraim and discussed Michelle Obama's new book: "I think that Michelle Obama clearly belongs to the strong and involved model of White House women."
